

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#### Sunset Crater, Arizona Daniel M. Seurer

The Hopi call it "Palatsmo". The Navajo know it as "Dzil K' idzitsooi." And according to Zuni tradition, their ancestors passed by the area during the eruption of Sunset Crater in the 11th Century.

Today, Sunset Crater is part of the Sunset Crater/Wupatki National Monument near Flagstaff in northern Arizona. There is a stark beauty here, born of numerous volcanic eruptions, the most recent of which created Sunset Crater. Archeological evidence has confirmed what the Hopi, Zuni, and Navajo traditions speak of. The remains of ancesestral Pueblo homesteads have been found buried under the black volcanic ash spewed from the eruption of Sunset Crater.

The impressive volcanic eruptions were visible for a hundred miles or more. The ash cloud spewing from Sunset volcano would have been seen as far away as Chaco Canyon in northwestern New Mexico.

It was likely that the residents had plenty of warning of the impending eruption, and were able to relocate away from the volcano, taking their possessions with them. After the eruptions, the edges of the volcanic ash field were repopulated, and remains of their architecture are featured at nearby Wupatki National Monument.
